It is not too late...

Created in 2004, the International Weather and Climate Forum (IWF) has become over the years a not-to-be-missed event of education and outreach on climate issues.

It facilitates the exchange of information between various actors (general public, scientists, companies, weather presenters, communities ...) so that everyone can act at his own level!

The IWF proposes a program for the General Public (exhibition, educational workshops, participative debates ...) and a program for Professionals including an International Symposium and a Media-Workshop gathering worldwide weather presenters.

It's not too late to save the planet by acting for the climate! But everyone has to make an effort to avoid suffering the consequences of a global warming which, if the Paris Agreement is not respected would exceed 3°C by the end of the century.

The latest IPCC Report reminds us that the commitments of all countries must go well beyond those made in 2015 within this Agreement, that businesses, investors and communities also set a roadmap and ambitious goals.

It is also necessary for everyone to act on a daily basis, by pursuing citizen initiatives such as the Climate March to reinforce the need for the ecological transition and simply by acting on a daily basis (transport, housing, food, tourism, consumption ...). We all have the keys to act!

The sharp rise in temperatures occurred during summer 2018 has helped to have a better attention, but everyone must be constantly aware of the emergency to act, and not only when extreme events occur ...

This is the very issue of the change of behaviors needed to overcome the challenges posed by climate change.

ABSTRACT

To respect the objectives of the **Paris Agreement**, it is essential to build a collective reflection associating climate sciences and social sciences that will lead to the necessary **change of behaviors** to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions and adapt.

This evolution must be undertaken not only by citizens **but also by governments, communities and businesses**, without excluding the education system and NGOs, which can play a key role.

Through keynote and roundtables, this International Symposium will highlight the diversity of climate concerns such as **youth mobilization** and the **social issue**, while bringing them into line with scientific orders of magnitude and thematic perspectives.



"Climate: Changing lifestyle and behaviors, a top priority, from citizen ... to collective"

Behaviors and lifestyles must be profoundly changed. This change can be driven by the citizens, but it needs to be supported by many other actors, both to provide the means for this impulse (information, education, organization), but also because the "sustainable" choices are conditioned by structural factors (price, supply, access). We shouldn't oppose individual choice and economic-social structure, or to pass the buck between actors, but make the two mutually reinforce each other.

The **1st keynote** will present the contribution of climate science and **IPCC perspectives** to think scale of behavioral changes and lifestyles. What do individual behaviors that are consistent with a 1.5 ° C scenario look like? In particular, for "sustainable" scenarios that limit the use of negative emission technologies?

The **2nd keynote** will propose a deciphering of the mechanism of the changes of lifestyles / practices from the **point of view of sociology**. This presentation will show that the behavioral approach cannot solve everything and that the collectives that shape these individual behaviors must also be taken into account.

The **roundtable 1** will provide an overview of **recent trends** aimed at limiting intermediate consumption and therefore the release of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere: circularity, short circuits, solidarity, proximity between sellers and consumers... The issue of solidarity is also linked to ecology, sharing of resources and energy.

The **3rd keynote** will report on the tool **OurLife21**, developed by the Association 4D. This tool helps to view dailies of families in 2050, in a society that wants to control its consumption of resources, its environmental impacts and live well in peaceful societies.

The **roundtable 2** will put forward the **levers for a lifestyle transformation** for climate: change of culture (zero waste, responsible consumption ...), mastery of the digital tool, or the supply of markets. The stake: to empower and put into perspective the different roles, of the citizens but especially of the companies and the public authorities.

The **roundtable 3** will focus on **major issues of behavioral transformations**, with questions on sustainable food, illustrated by the action of the City of Paris, or the question of buildings, eco-renovation and energy consumption, but also sustainable mobility or the environmental impact of fashion.

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Brune POIRSON

Secretary of State attached to the Minister of State, Minister of Ecological and Solidary Transition

Brune Poirson was born in Washington DC on 1st September, 1982. Originally from Vaucluse, she studied at Sciences Po Aix, then at the London School of Economics (UK), and then at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. She began her career in England where she worked as a Project Manager for Nesta (the National Endowment for Science, Technology and the Arts). She continued her career in innovation and development in India, and then the United States. She has worked in the public (AFD), private (Veolia), and voluntary (Nesta) sectors.

Elected a member of Vaucluse's 3rd constituency on 18th June, 2017, Brune Poirson was then appointed Secretary of State attached to the Minister of State, and Minister of Ecological and Solidary Transition on 21st June, 2017.

On March 20th, 2019, she was elected Vice-president of the United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA) for two years.



Anne HIDALGO

Mayor of Paris.
Chair of C40 Cities

Anne Hidalgo holds a master's degree in labour social sciences and a DEA in social and union law. In 1984, she began a career as a labour inspector and remained in her post until 1993, when she joined the Ministry of Labour in the vocational training delegation. Member of the Socialist Party since 1994, she was National Secretary of the Party for Culture and Media, after having been in charge of vocational training. First Deputy Mayor of Paris, Bertrand Delanoë since 2001, she was also elected regional councilor of Ile-de-France in April 2004, and re-elected in March 2010. In March 2014 her list wins the municipal election in Paris and she becomes on April 5, 2014 the first woman Mayor of Paris.



Jean JOUZEL

President of Météo et Climat. Climatologist, former member of the IPCC.

Research director at the CEA, **Jean Jouzel** is an expert in Climate and Glaciology. He has mainly worked on the reconstruction of past climate derived from the study of the Antarctic and Greenland ice. As a lead author, he participated in the IPCC reports on Climate Change. He has been a member of the IPCC Bureau and Vice President of its Scientific Working Group from 2002 to 2015. From 2001 to 2008, he headed the IPSL, one of the main components is the Laboratory of Climate and Environmental Sciences. His work has been recognized with awards and decorations, such as Milankovitch and Revelle medals. Together with Claude Lorius, he was awarded the gold medal by the CNRS in 2002. In 2012, he was awarded the "Climate Change Award" by the Prince Albert II of Monaco Foundation and the Vetlesen Prize, which is referred to as the Nobel Prize for Earth sciences. Since 2016, he is a foreign Associate of the National Academy of Sciences.

Lola Vallejo is Director of the Climate Program at Iddri - Institute for Sustainable Development and International Relations. She also assessed the UK's adaptation Policy in the framework of the National Advisory and Monitoring Committee, the Committee on Climate Change.

Previously, she coordinated research on decarbonization trajectories at Imperial College London and worked as an environmental strategy consultant in Paris. She holds a Masters degree in Science Po and an MSc in Environmental Technology from Imperial College London.

Valérie Masson-Delmotte is a Research-Director at the Laboratory of Climate and Environmental Sciences (Pierre Simon Laplace Institute, CEA-CNRS-UVSQ). Her work focuses on the past evolution of the climate. She contributed to the drafting of the 5th assessment report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

She also seeks to facilitate the appropriation of knowledge on climate change by the general public, through various lectures towards Youth and the general public and some popular science writings. She was awarded the Irène Joliot-Curie Prize as Scientific Woman of the Year 2013. In September 2015, she received the 2015 Martha T. Muse Award for "Science and Policy in Antarctica" for her research on ice cores from EPICA Dome C in Antarctica. In October 2015, she was elected Co-Chair of IPCC Group 1.

Sophie Dubuisson-Quellier is a CNRS research professor, and deputy director of the Centre de sociologie des organisations (CNRS-Sciences Po). She works in the field of economic sociology, analyzing the way in which economic behaviors of consumers are shaped by the intervention of market actors, social movements and the state. She has been working on ethical consumption and on public policies targeting individuals. She is the author of several books: *Le biais comportementaliste* (Presses de Sciences Po, 2018, with H. Bergeron, P. Castel, J. Lazarus, E. Nouguez and O. Pilmis), *Gouverner les conduites* (Presses de sciences Po, 2016) and *Ethical consumption* (Fernwood Publishers, 2013).

Sophie Dubuisson-Quellier is a member of the Scientific Council of ADEME. She is a graduate of the Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Grenoble and holds a PhD from the Ecole des Mines de Paris.

Sociologist at ADEME.

Solange Martin holds a PhD in the field of sociology of sciences and technologies and a Master degree in Economics. She also graduated from Sciences Po Paris. She began her career as a research fellow and took part in several European research projects. Her projects involved working on a methodology to monitor and evaluate innovative projects in the field of transportation. She joined the French Agency for Environment and Energy Management (ADEME) in 2006. She is currently in charge of managing a variety of projects related to social sciences and the environment, for instance surveys, research projects, foresight studies and professional training. Her area of expertise covers mostly consumption, energy, waste, air quality and transportation.

Martial Breton is a Master's student in Transition Governance, Ecology and Society at the University of Paris Saclay. A member of the international youth organization CliMates for four years, he was co-director of the "Empowerment" cluster in 2018 and then vice-president of the association in 2019. At the initiative of the Call for an Ecological Constitution in 2018, an advocacy campaign on the ongoing constitutional reform, aimed at introducing new environmental protection principles into the Constitution. He is working on bringing together youth organizations around climate issues when the Youth For Climate movement was created in France. He has co-organized the February 22nd march in Paris, with Greta Thunberg and young people from several European countries, as well as the March 15th march, which brought together more than 40,000 young people in the streets.

Economist at ADEME & researcher

Emmanuel Combet is engineer and economist at the Economics, Research and Foresight Department of the French Environment and Energy Management Agency (Ademe). Since 2016, he has been coordinating the construction and evaluation of ecological transition scenarios. He managed the publication of the long-term scenario "Visions Ademe 2017" and participated in the analysis of the French National Low-Carbon Strategy and the French Multiannual Energy Plan. Emmanuel has also published research articles on the issues of a just and acceptable energy transition. Since 2007, he has been studying the effects of carbon taxation and alternative uses of its revenue on activity, employment, inequality, poverty, public finances and CO2 emissions. As a researcher at the Centre for International Research on Environment and Development (Cired) he was member of the Rocard Commission (2009) and recently published a book with Jean-Charles Hourcade, *Fiscalité Carbone et Finance Climat. Un contrat social pour notre temps* (2017).

Julien Gasc is a student at ESCP Europe where he is president of NOISE ESCP (New Observatory of Social and Environmental Innovation). He is also a member and one of the voices of the Student Manifesto for an ecological awakening. This manifesto - signed by 30,000 students - call upon companies and public authorities on the emergency of environmental issues. Above all, it expresses our determination to work only for companies that truly appreciate the scope of these stakes.

This argument allows us to directly address CSR directors and business leaders. In addition, we implement a reading grid to guide students in their choice of internships / jobs and to avoid falling into greenwashing. Regarding Higher Education, we help signatories to deal with Environment into their program and we act on national institutions.

Sodeh Hamzehlouyan is involved in the CSA movement for more than 3 years, promoting the new consumption and production paradigm, and involved mostly in Communication and Advocacy at a local, national and international level. The CSA Network in Paris Region (Réseau Amap en Ile de France) is the regional non-for-profit structure gathering Community Supported Agriculture Associations in the Paris and neighbor cities area. Its mission is to promote and help the creation of new groups of Community supported Agriculture local associations, as well as provide all the needed support to future organic and small scale farming projects in the Region: preserving agriculture land and installing farmers are the main missions. The Network gathers more than 320 CSA groups with overall 60 K citizens and 160 small scale and local farmers.

Thibault Turchet has a lawyer background, especially in public & environmental law. He joined Zero Waste France back in 2014 as legal campaigner. He introduces and follow the national and local lawsuits intended by the association, and runs the group of fellow local groups. Pierre Verri is an engineer and Deputy Director of the Scientific and Technical Center of Grenoble Building. Mayor of Gières - Municipality of Greater Grenoble- he is President of the Local Agency of Energy and Climate of Grenoble Alpes Métropole (GAM) and President of FLAME, the national network of Local Energy Agencies. Since 2014, he has been leading within Greater Grenoble -the first in France to have adopted a Climate Air Territorial Energy Plan- the renovation campaign MURMUR2, which aims to renovate nearly 10,000 housing buildings between 2015 and 2020, thus contributing to more than 90 million euros of work and 1800 jobs in the Grenoble area. As president of FLAME, he coordinates the action of nearly 40 Local Energy and Climate Agencies in France, ie 500 agents who accompany daily, citizens and elected officials in the implementation of the Energy Transition.

Célia Blauel graduated from the Institute of Political Studies in Strasbourg in 2003.

A member of the Greens since 2006, she was elected in 2008 to the position of counsellor of the City of Paris' 14th district, assuming responsibility for green areas and mobile telephony.

Since the Municipal elections of March 2014, she is Paris Deputy Mayor in charge of Environment, Sustainable Development, Climate Plan for Energy, and water resources. And sanitation since October 2018.

She leads the implementation of three ambitious action plans affecting Parisians in their daily lives: the Environmental Noise Prevention Plan, the Sustainable Food Plan, and the Plan "1000 private buildings for thermal renovation". She also led to the adoption in 2015 of the Paris Adaptation Strategy to the impacts of climate change. She is also President of Eau de Paris, a public company that produces and distributes drinking water to Parisians.
